WHAT HE DOES

Treats patients by integrating traditional healing methods with western medicine

THE EARLY YEARS

The third of the five children of Fr Mathai Nooranal, a priest who ran a cooperative bank to improve the economic status of locals in Sulthanbathery, Issac grew up in a close-knit and service-oriented family. "My parents were unconditional in their service. My mother was the only doctor in the forest-dominated Wayanad. Patients could walk into her clinic at midnight and she would treat them with a smile on her face. As children we were told, 'If your intention is right, you can never be

wrong or fail in your task'."

The family knew that the next doctor in the family after his mother was only Issac. "I did my fiveand-a-half-year graduation in Homoeopathy from Kottayam Medical College. I enrolled for yoga therapy course. I saw a number of allopathy doctors learning homoeopathy. That's when I realized that medicine should be complementary and integrated for holistic treatment of patients. It made me realize that it's not important which form of medicine cures a patient, it is the treatment which is more crucial. I believe there should be no barrier between different forms of medicine as long as the patient is cured of his/her illness."

Not just in his healing thousands of patients and his global practice, Issac was different even as a student. "I enrolled for a course in transcendental meditation. I would shut myself in a room and meditate. My friends in the hostel would call me a mad guy."

TURNING POINT IN LIFE

"I heard about an international conference in France on medicine. I knew it was impossible for me to go. First, the finances and who was I anyway? What was my achievement at 25? When there were so many senior doctors, I had little chance to make it."

But the go-getter that he is, Issac wrote a paper on yogic management in homoeopathy and sent it to the conference organizers. "They accepted it and wanted me to speak at the conference. I was on top of the world. I told my mother to make 200 neti pots (a traditional tool to heal respiratory problems). I carried them with me to France, distributed to the foreign delegates and talked about India's rich traditional healing systems. That was the beginning. I got job

offers in London. And I grabbed the opportunity and decided to work there."

BRUSH WITH CELEBS

Everywhere he went, the Wayanad boy spoke about India's traditional medicines and how they can be integrated with Western medicine for complete cure. "Having studied in Malayalam medium, I was keen on polishing my English. There would be several prominent people who would come to the clinic where I was practising. One day, I noticed several girls lined up in front of my clinic to catch a glimpse of one of my patients -George Harrison. They asked me if I had seen Harrison and I said I treated him for his voice as he had a concert the next week. But for the girls, I wouldn't have known he was a part of the Beatles!" Ditto with Tina Turner.

Eventually the doctor became more famous than the patient. "I would fly in private jets with these celebs. I became famous without my knowledge."

MY FIRST BENZ

I told myself I will work towards owning one before I turn 50. In 1995, I saw a second-hand Benz in a London showroom. I loved it but knew I could not afford it. After much negotiations, the shop owner agreed to sell it to me and I could pay in instalments. And Lo! I got it! And I was just 35 then... 15 years ahead of my vow to own a Benz!

TAUGHT YOGA IN LONDON

"Every evening, I would teach yoga for two pounds per hour in London for students. The money I earned from that would go towards my swimming classes. To save money, I would cycle everywhere."

But after three years of globe-trotting, Issac began to feel the need to return to his roots. "I wanted to return to India and get these celebs to our country to show them what we Indians can do in healthcare. And Bangalore was the chosen destination. But I was firm on practising integrated medicine for I realized that there was so much behind the disease of the patient. And holistic treatment was the answer."

his nutritionist wife Suja borrowed from friends, networked with experts to build the 30-acre healing centre off Whitefield.

The entire design of the centre where just about everything is natural (vegetables, spices and medicinal herbs are grown there) was done by Suja. "We wanted to make it as natural as possible yet sophisticated," says Dr Suja who has stood like a pillar behind Dr Issac to realise his 'holistic' dream.
